Numinous (/ ' n j uː m ɪ n ə s /) is a concept derived from the Latin numen meaning "arousing spiritual or religious emotion; mysterious or awe-inspiring". The term was popularized by the German theologian Rudolf Otto in his influential 1917 German book *Das Heilige*, which appeared in English as *The Idea of the Holy* in 1923.

The other 3 words mentioned above—numinous, numinosum and numinosity—Jung used frequently and all of them derive from numen. “Numinous” was an invented word, coined in 1917 by a German professor of theology, Rudolf Otto, in his book *Das Heilige* (translated in 1923 as *The Idea of the Holy*). Rudolf Otto's Concept of the "Numinous" Otto was one of the most influential thinkers about religion in the first half of the twentieth century. He is best known for his analysis of the experience that, in his view, underlies all religion. He calls this experience "numinous," and says it has three components.

Rudolf Otto showed that the vast majority of human beings have a natural sense – or feeling of spiritual mystery – that he called the “numinous experience.” He outlined several elements of that experience. Characteristics of the Numinous Experience. A sense of a mysterious power – which is beyond us, and incomprehensible.

The numinous, the awe-inspiring element of religious experience, Otto contended, evades precise formulation in words. Like the beauty of a musical composition, it is non-rational and eludes complete conceptual analysis; hence it must be discussed in symbolic terms.

Rudolf Otto (25 September 1869 – 7 March 1937) was an eminent German Lutheran theologian, philosopher, and comparative religionist. He is regarded as one of the most influential scholars of religion in the early twentieth century and is best known for his concept of the numinous, a profound emotional experience he argued was at the heart of the world's religions.

His concept of the numinous combines a surprisingly bold initial assertion of its existence as an external reality (he speaks of 'the external presence or reality of the numinous', p.29) with a silence on what this 'reality' might actually be.

Numinous is from the Latin word numen, meaning "divine will" or "nod" (it suggests a figurative nodding, of assent or of command, of the divine head). English speakers have been using numen for centuries with the meaning "a spiritual force or influence."

Otto coined the word numinous (from the Latin numen, meaning sacred presence) to describe it. This does not mean that chronologically in a person's life other experiences, such as intellectual curiosity, The thesis of this book is that a sense of God's presence, with its attendant emotions of sacredness, wonderment and awe, is the fundamental starting point of genuine religion.
